
Other Features BOOK REVIEW

Master of War

By Benson Bobrick Review by Chuck Critchfield

Who was the Civil War's greatest general? This is a discussion I have often heard. There are several candidates coming from both sides for this honor. To me there is no way to measure greatness. However, I would ponder at times at who was the most successful general. And this author, Benson Bobrick, advances the opinion that George H. Thomas was the most successful general of the Civil War.

This book starts out as standard biography of Thomas but about halfway through when Grant and Sherman enter Thomas' career in a meaningful way, this book takes on a new character.



Bobrick is a bit of a maverick when compared to other historians. I have heard him speak And he bucks the popular on YouTube. historical thread about Grant and Sherman. Bobrick downgrades, criticizes and castigates Grant and Sherman, especially when it comes to comparisons with Thomas. By the end of the book the author really lowers the boom on Sherman, Grant, Sheridan and Schofield, even accusing them of falsifying some reports to steer credit away from Thomas. Bobrick becomes a bit of a cheerleader for Thomas and digs up primary sources from the mid 1860's comparing Thomas to Washington. To Bobrick's credit, he does present a creditable defense of those claims.

His career is well documented here. From his pre-war days and close friendship with Robert E. Lee to his final days as the military commander on the West Coast. Many argue he never lost a battle and saved the Army of Cumberland at Stone's River and Chickamauga. His troops stormed Missionary Ridge, fought well through out the Atlanta campaign. And finally with command of entire army, he defeated Hood at Nashville in a battle that is still studied. He was architect of Wilson's final cavalry raid.

Thomas died at his desk in San Francisco responding to an anonymous letter on the front page of the New York Times giving credit to Schofield for the success of the Nashville Campaign – probably written by Jacob Cox with the approval of Schofield. Thomas who had tried to stay above the fray and the developing "battle of the books," finally felt the need to respond and began a letter – a letter he never finished. He suffered a stroke in mid-letter and died later that day.

This is a good book. I would recommend it to anyone interested in Union commanders. And you Confederate aficionados will get satisfaction from how Bobrick excoriates Grant and Sherman.


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George H. Sharpe

Here is another book of contrasts. A contrast between the subject's military and civilian career. I thoroughly enjoyed the narrative of his military career. The civilian story gets bogged down.

My impression of the Army of the Potomac's intelligence gathering is influenced by Pinkerton's attempts for George McClellan. When Joseph Hooker takes command, to his credit he asks George H. Sharpe to take command of information gathering and what takes shape is the Bureau of Military Intelligence. Beginning with Chancellorsville Sharpe and his staff develop a success apparatus for gathering information from scouts, escaped slaves, prisoners and loyal civilians in Virginia.



George Meade is less a believer in the BMI and maintains his own intelligence operation which is modeled on the old method in which the army commander himself assembles all the reports and actually interviews prisoners

himself. Meade eventually gives way more and more to Sharpe and the BMI.

The descriptions of actual intelligence gathering and methods are worth the reading of this book. As I said, I had little knowledge that the Federal army did anything but bungle its way through the war in Virginia because of bad intelligence. This book displaces that notion.

The author also provides some insight on how the Confederate intelligence gathering worked. In the days between Gettsyburg and the Overland Campaign, each side probed the other using a number of different methods. The Federals developed a contact deep within Richmond that had the ability to provide intelligence from the Confederate White House.

The appendices and notes provide another fascinating bit of information about the BMI and their methods.
